From Voices to Veggies



When we last reported to the Slopes Quarterly the Healthy Futures team of Public Allies Pittsburgh was preparing for collaboration with the Slopes Association and Grow Pittsburgh on starting a community garden at Bandi Shaum Field in the South Side Slopes neighborhood.

Initially we thought we would be utilized to do outreach to make the community aware of the garden. However, when we were told that outreach was already covered our team was left with one question, "What are we going to do now?"

We began to think about our focus area and ultimately what we wanted to accomplish. During a brainstorming session one of our team members, Maya Wilkerson revealed that during her work in the Hilltop area she networked with Richard Carrington, Director of Voices Against Violence (VAV). VAV is an organization that operates on the South Side in both Carrick and Brashear high schools as an afterschool program aimed at working with young people to prevent and reduce violence.

Our team thought about how we could incorporate the group into the community garden. Knowing that one of our objectives is reducing childhood obesity we decided that it would be an excellent idea to start a summer youth gardening program in collaboration with VAV and the Slopes Association.

We presented the idea to Richard, who was supportive and excited to start working with us. Upon learning about the idea, VAV's youth were very engaged and we were able to get 16 students signed up to participate.

We thought about potential names for the program and decided that in honor of our new partnership with VAV and the goal of gardening to name the program, Veggies Against Violence.

Our main objective with the "Veggies" is to build a successful youth gardening program to be sustained after this summer with the help of VAV, Grow Pittsburgh, the Slope Association, a team of community stakeholders and a gardening manual that we are creating.

The Slopes Association has been gracious enough to be our main fiscal sponsor assisting us with the cost of tools, seedlings, and t-shirts. We plan on gardening with the "Veggies" periodically throughout the summer.

May 5th began that process with a mulching session from 9 am to 1 pm at the garden. May 11th 4 allies went with VAV member, Melvin Goins, to the May Market at Phipps Conservatory to buy seedlings of vegetables the group decided they wanted to grow. There was another mulching session May 12th, which resulted in an awesome turn out from members of Slopes Association, Voices Against Violence, and Public Allies.

It is our privilege to be working with such stellar organizations and people. We are sure that by listening to the community, working together and staying on task we will succeed with this project. *Corey Carrington*

21st Annual Historic South Side Home Tour

This year the tour was hosted by the South Side Community Council for the first time as the South Side Local Development Company prepares to cease operations at the end of June. The entire tour included an additional nine homes on the Flats as well as a stop at the Phillips School playground gardens. A total of 1315 tickets were sold for the event.

The "All Wars Memorial" on Pius Street that SSSNA and the Elm Street Committee refurbished was again spruced up on Memorial Day weekend. New grass has been planted. Pruning, weeding and mulching has given it new life. A new 6ft. x 10ft. flag now whips in the wind. The Veterans came and had a ceremony there with a gun salute, small flag replacement, and a wreathplaced to honor those who died to keep us free.

The Triangle Garden at 18th and Josephine Streets will be mulched in the upcoming weeks. The plants have flourished with the many days of rain and mild temperatures. The brick sidewalk has been tamed and is exposed.

The Garden at Monastery and Brosville is a shining example of good neighbor volunteers. The bushes are full of life. The tree that was beaten down by "Snowmageddon" is alive and well.

These are but a few of our larger gardens. The best thing about our Slopes Gardens is not only their outer beauty, but the inner beauty that is the volunteers who help to maintain them. We thank you all and encourage more of you to help with the weeding and watering. Several neighbors nurture, mow, weed and mulch.
