### SOUTH SIDE SLOPES RECEIVES \$100K TO EVALUATE, REPAIR PUBLIC STEPS

Allegheny County grant will strengthen network of vital infrastructure



Pittsburgh, PA—On June 20, 2014, the South Side Slopes Neighborhood Association (SSSNA) was awarded \$100,000 from Allegheny County's Community Infrastructure and Tourism Fund for the rehabilitation of public steps in the neighborhood. The grant will allow the SSSNA to complete an engineering study of the neighborhood's stairways, prioritize repairs, and rehabilitate some sets of steps. The South Side Slopes has 68 sets of public steps, the most of any neighborhood in Pittsburgh.

"The steps are the bones of the Slopes," said Brian Oswald, association President. "They connect the thousands of residents in the Slopes to the East Carson business district, to bus lines, and to the parks throughout the neighborhood. Life would be a lot harder in the Slopes without these steps."

Oswald added, "Walk-able neighborhoods are highly coveted, across the country. Keeping our walking infrastructure in good repair means our neighborhood will hold and grow its value. This grant is good for our neighbors, good for business, and good for the city."

Over the last few years, the SSSNA has secured hundreds of thousands of dollars in private and municipal grants for improvements to the public steps. Volunteers have spent countless hours painting handrails, cutting back overgrowth, and picking up litter along the stairways. Proof that the community values these steps is given each year during StepTrek, a self-guided tour of the neighborhood that attracts around one thousand participants. StepTrek 2014 is scheduled for Saturday October 4



Work will start soon, with the study of the eastern Slopes . All studies and funded repairs will be completed by June 2016.

The South Side Slopes Neighborhood Association works to "maintain, foster and improve the quality of life, safety and unity of our Slopes neighborhood."

The Community Infrastructure and Tourism Fund provides "financial assistance to entities to facilitate economic development through infrastructure assistance, stabilize or correct existing infrastructure problems, or plan and prepare sites and buildings for future use."

### **Nextdoor.com Connects Slopes Residents**



Nextdoor.com is a free, private social media site that is localized to the neighborhood in which you live in, in this case the South Side Slopes. The premise of the website is to build safer, stronger communities by connecting people who live in the same neighborhood as each other.

Today, only about 25% of people actually know who lives directly next door to them. With technology filling our lives, people have become much more comfortable socializing in front of computer screens. I am guilty of it as well; we all have our online identities. Nextdoor was built with that in mind and the idea is to start an online connection with the hopes of the relationship building into a personal, ever-lasting human connection.

On our Nextdoor site, in the Slopes, people are posting things like organizing walks through South Side Park, creating gardening and wine groups, posting information about missing pets in the area as well as houses that are for sale. I have personally used it to borrow my neighbor's extension cord and to help a neighbor look for his lost dog.

Our neighborhood is growing quite quickly on the site, too, a few weeks ago we hit fifty users and now we are on the cusp of one hundred! This may have happened due to the fact that a few weeks ago Nextdoor launched an official partnership with the city of Pittsburgh. This connected the Mayor's office, the Public Works department and the Pittsburgh Police to the site. They will each be able to post information to your feed regarding crime alerts, weather alerts, or just general information that would be important for residents of Pittsburgh to know about.



Since privacy is a huge part of the Nextdoor experience these departments will not be able to see the content being posted in your own neighborhood, in fact, only people who live in the Slopes can see what is being posted in the Slopes. There is a secure verification process that you must go through to sign up for the site. This involves giving your name, email address as well as your home address when signing up. Nextdoor then verifies that you live in your given neighborhood by asking you to supply proof. Something like a credit card bill that is tied to your address, or perhaps a landline, they will call you for free to have you verify your address. My personal favorite is Nextdoor will mail you a postcard to your address with a verification code for you to prove your residency within a neighborhood, how old school!

I would say give it a try, meet the people who help build our community, invite them over for a BBQ, because really, neighborhoods were the original social network. Hope to see you around the 'hood! SSSNA Participates in 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Hilltop Community Day Block Party


