



## Looking back: The origins of the SSSNA

On Memorial Day weekend 1998, a fire that started on Holt Street destroyed three homes in the time that it took the fire department to arrive and stage their equipment. Due to the challenging topography of the South Side Slopes—the narrow, hilly streets and tight corners—the fire was devastating. Because of this tragedy, a group of active Slopes neighbors became galvanized. Throughout the summer, many meetings were held and by October 1998 a Board of Directors was chosen and the South Side Slopes Neighborhood Association (SSSNA) was born. Within a year, the City had plans to order four smaller pumper trucks with a tighter turning radius and narrow wheel span to safely traverse all of the hilly City neighborhoods,

including the Slopes. The momentum gained from this triumph kept us going.... our first slogan was "SOS/Save Our Slopes."

In those early days, the SSSNA board was a scrappy, committed crew — a spirit that carries on in today's board. The ideas and projects were large, and the budget was shoestring. The then-monthly newsletter was funded by taking up a collection from the community. The first grant of \$250 made us feel like millionaires! One of our first partners was the former South Side Local Development Company (SSLDC). They helped us gain our footing as an organization, and through which we received an Elm Street designation for five years, folding into the Main Street designation that SSLDC had from the State. 
SSSNA also became a member organization of the South Side Planning Forum. We attended City zoning hearings and invited developers with plans to build/restore in the Slopes, share their plans and get our input from the community.

We began long-standing relationships with City, County and State agencies and officials, as well as the Pittsburgh police. Many of the City partnerships and projects involved public safety. In 2002, we worked to get two pedestrian footbridges over the railroad tracks at 10th and 15th Streets replaced with Core ten steel, adding safety lighting three years later. We also had safety lighting installed under the railroad underpasses on 18th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 24th, 26th and 27th Streets.

Another big focus was, and still is, on beautification of our green spaces. Partnering with the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy (WPC), we built gardens along Josephine Street at Greeley and Barry Streets in 2000, and then on 18th Street at the "Bend" and the "Triangle" at Josephine in 2003. More than 50 shade trees were planted along Josephine Street on Arbor Day in 2003. The All Wars Memorial on Pius Street was dedicated in 2007 (rededicated on Sept. 11, 2011). In 2008, the garden at Brosville and Monastery Streets was installed with a Core ten steel scrim signage with lights.

#### South Side Park: Master Plan Revealed

On May 15, the City, Friends of South Side Park advisory committee and consultants from Studio Bryan Hanes, unveiled the South Side Park Master Plan. After months of community input from neighbors and organizations with a vested interest in the park, the consultants revealed a final draft plan for South Side Park. The plan, which is broken into several phases of development, shows an ambitious yet thoughtful blueprint for future enhancements. The proposal introduces several storm water management solutions, public art installations, outdoor recreation space amenities, improved sports fields and facilities and more. What was our most successful, hair-brained idea? StepTrek. While other neighborhoods had home tours, we knew that the Slopes was unique and should be showcased differently. Author Bob Regan was writing a book (*The Steps of Pittsburgh: Portrait of a City*) about the public stairways throughout the City—so there was some buzz about the steps. Slopes residents Ed Jacob and Mike Milberger brought an idea to the board that the City steps should be celebrated. The fledgling board decided to give it a try, and StepTrek was a go. Hundreds of people paid

money to walk miles of steps—for a good cause. In 2000, we held the first StepTrek. Now in its 18th year, StepTrek has enabled thousands of people to experience the amazing views that we get to see every day.

It has been an amazing journey. It is hard to imagine 20 years ago how much would be accomplished. The loss of the homes to fire in 1998 was terrible, but from that came a community that focused on more safety, advocacy and continuous improvement. Since the SSSNA board was founded, dozens of amazing neighbors have served and added to the energy and progress of the community. Thank you to all who served, partnered, volunteered, cleaned, photographed, documented, shared, trekked and donated. The success of SSSNA and the neighborhood is because of you! Cheers to the next 20 years!


