

PWSA's Lead Line Replacement Program

Under an order from the Pennsylvania Department of Environment, PWSA was required to replace 1,500 public lead lines from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 2018. They replaced approximately 2,050 public lead lines and 1,300 private lines.

Through a \$49 million in funding from PENNVEST, PWSA will replace at least 3,400 lead service lines in 2019. They are reaching residents of neighborhoods — which includes the South Side Slopes — where they plan to replace lead lines this year to explain the project and urge homeowners to have their private lead lines replaced. PWSA plans to replace all the lead service lines in the system by 2026.

Reimagining the E. Carson Street



Although we are residents of the Slopes, one of our main business districts is the East Carson St. corridor. The Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA) has spearheaded a redevelopment initiative that will create a new business district plan for East Carson Street.

The goal of the plan is to imagine new ways to support neighborhood residents and visitors to the area. The plan

engaged engaging a variety of stakeholders, including residents, local business owners, employees of local businesses, and visitors to the neighborhood.

City Council - District 3

The primary race for the seat of City Council District 3 has four candidates running for a four-year term. The district is comprised of the following neighborhoods: Allentown, Arlington, Arlington Heights, Beltzhoover, Central Oakland, Knoxville, Mt. Oliver, Oakcliffe, South Oakland, South Side Flats, South Side Slopes and St. Clair. Candidates running for the City Council – District 3 seat are as follows:



AMY SCHREMPF

South Side resident Amy Schrempf graduated cum laude from the University of Pittsburgh School of Law in 2001 and is a practicing attorney working in Municipal Law for almost 20 years.

Amy cites an unmanageable, piecemeal permit parking program, continued parking and traffic issues, illegal dumpsites, storm sewers that back up, lack of police presence, poor treatment of our communities by visitors, litter, graffiti and overgrown vegetation as areas where we have a great opportunity to change and improve. She thinks that good neighbors build great neighborhoods and

City to Distribute More Blue Recycling Bins

According to the City of Pittsburgh Department of Public Works, it has asked for support from City Council to receive a \$350,000 grant from the state Department of Environmental Protection for the purchase of 13,000 residential curbside recycling containers.

Once approved, the funding will allow the purchase of blue bins that will be distributed to residents over the next two years.

Distribution plans for the new bins and sign-up procedures have not yet been finalized.

BRUCE KRAUS

Incumbent City Council President Bruce A. Kraus, is running for reelection after serving on City Council for two terms, the first in 2008 and the second in 2012. He was elected president of Pittsburgh City Council in 2014.

As a Councilman, Bruce has sponsored a diverse selection of legislation over the years. He has focused on improving night life throughout the district and Pittsburgh through improved public safety and transportation. He collaborated with Public Works to reopen the South Side Market House senior program center, assisted in securing support for the renovation of the Carson St. branch of the Carnegie Library and is helping with current renovation efforts to the Knoxville branch of the Carnegie Library, and is working to make improvements in waste management and recycling. Growing up on the Hill

We asked people on a Facebook group page (South Side then and now) to share his/her memories of growing up in the Slopes. Here's a fun sampling:

"I first lived on McCord Street. We pretty much stuck to our street. Played all the games Pittsburgh kids played. No one traveled our street in the winter, it was THAT BAD. One tried and almost went over the cliff down to the street below (Josephine Street)." — Ellen Proskey Matthews

"At the top of 19th Street the firemen used to open a fire hydrant so we could get wet and cool off during the hot summer months." — Matthew Nolan

"Growing up in the 40s and 50s there were no "slopes," we called them "hills." I lived on Magdalene Street, which was on Bill Buck Hill. We played games, roller skated, walked all over the South Side, rode bikes, swam at the pools on 22nd street and 10th street. 4th of July was always spent at Quarry Field where they had races all day. I think the winners got a dime. In the evening, I remember music and dancing there. Also, St Michaels had a decent sized carousel on their property, which was open during their carnivals." — Bonnie Rogan

"I grew up on Sumner Street, above Mission Street, in the 80s and 90s. I remember sitting in the middle of our street watching fireworks every summer, eating sunflower seeds we stole from the neighbor's garden. So many great memories I have from that neighborhood!" — Ashley Miller-Bertram

"Growing up in the South Side in the 60s was more like living in a small town in a large city. Everyone seemed to know everyone. Neighbors always watched out for each other and helped each other. We did most of our shopping locally. With local shopping, bowling alleys, and theaters, you had very little reason to leave the South Side." — Christine Geo

"I'm originally from St. Paul Street (Billy Buck Hill). I remember playing in the woods behind my house and building "tree shacks." We also used to sneak into the woods behind St. Paul Monastery and would sled ride down the hills in the winter." — Chris Korbelic

"The fireworks at the Fort on the 4th of July in the 50s and 60s are my favorite memory. Many years since they did that." — Ellen Carlin

"I grew up on St. Leo Street, which was called the brickyard because our backyard was made of red bricks. It was a common yard, 8 row houses, 4 on each side shared the yard. There were tons of kids to play with on the block. It was right below Billy Buck Hill and we played on those hills, sled riding, riding bikes around the circle that makes up the brickyard. We also went over to Quarry Field to ice skate, play football or swing in the playground." — Roberta Kozel

"I grew up on Baldauf
Street on Billy Buck Hill.
We had a boardwalk in
front of our house
instead of a sidewalk.
No matter where you
would go, there were
steps everywhere. I
remember the "ice ball"
mad who came around
every night in his station
wagon and would sell
the ice balls for a dime."

"I lived on Mission and Leticoe in the 70s and 80s. On 4th of July everyone would gather at the Mission St bridges with the whole family. People brought chairs, blankets, snacks, sparkers, those snap things, and "snakes." It was so much fun!" — Dana Benton

"I grew up on Josephine Street, right across from the Basin. The South Side Sooners practiced there, when we were young watching practice was one of our highlights of the day. We also watched companies like Heinz or Clark playing baseball there. They all loved us sitting on the sidelines cheering them on. Each company would bring boxes and boxes of goodies for all of the neighborhood children." — Connie Marie Mauro

"I remember watching fireworks from the school ruins on Eleanor St. I remember playing in saltboxes and sledding down a hill about the middle of Burham Street. I remember running all over South Side and Mt. Oliver, going to libraries, a record shop, and a favorite Pizza shop. On Saturday night there was a bus that picked up up from a parking lot in Mt. Oliver and took us out to a rollerskating rink." — Lorraine Simoneau
